## The Inside Scoop

Do you ever wonder how authors come up with character names? I know different writers have different methods. Some look up names that were common during certain periods, say the 1990s or the 1840s. Some search for appropriate ethnic or cultural names. Some may even just use whatever name comes to mind.

For me, a name has to *feel* right. I don't consciously think of attributes, and yet I want a name to somehow invoke a character's traits. So, what I do is hold the character in mind, watch, and wait. Sometimes, the name comes quickly and easily. Other times, I might try out different names, paying attention to see how each one lands.

It's a visceral process. When the right name presents itself, my stomach quivers, or a shiver shinnies up my spine, or excitement sparks in my chest. I feel satisfied. I feel good. I just *know*.

I can't share right now, how I came up with the names of my three major characters, Zee, Rico, and Fontina. I want you to discover their personalities for yourself. But know that the process of naming characters is yet another fascinating part of writing for me.

The Great Pastry Hunt: update

Zee Morani, the protagonist in *Knife Edge*, is legendary for her love of pastry. I've taken on the task of finding one or more particularly tasty delicacies to feature in book 2. (I know, research is hard, but I'm a professional.)

This month's discovery comes from Café Lola.

#### Cinnamon Roll

I've heard that you eat first with your eyes, so I took a moment to admire this baked spiral, lightly browned, brushed with frosting (possibly a bit more than I prefer), teasing with tantalizing dark crevices. I uncurled part of a strip. Inside the crusty edge, it separated into delicate, tissue-thin layers.

My eyes having feasted, I popped the piece into my mouth. The pastry was buttery and flaky, lightly sweet and slightly crunchy, especially the outer layer. The ribbon of cinnamon-sugar was spicier than I expected, its piquancy sweetened just enough to enhance the flavor.

I always save the middle for last because it has the most intensity. This one delivered a final tangy flourish, but I could have done with less frosting. Easily remedied next time!
