



The Great Pastry Hunt: update

Lest you think that writing is all banging my fingers on the keyboard—and possibly banging my head *against* the keyboard—never fear. Some parts are quite rewarding. In my continuing quest to find yummy pastries for Zee, I ventured this month into old Henderson, to Chef Flemming's Bakeshop on Water Street. And here's what I found.

Pecan Roll



From the outside, this looked like any scrumptious, perfectly crafted pecan roll, crowned by a multitude of chopped nuts, glistening in a brown sugar glaze. My taste buds skipped with anticipation.

The first bite through the delicate crust yielded the expected sweet rush. This could have been overwhelming, but instead it was perfectly complemented by the pecans' earthy umami. I love this combination. It enables me to eat sweets without getting a sugar headache.

As I savored that first bite, my tongue detected a delightful surprise, the aromatic pungency of cinnamon. A closer examination of the tender inner layers of the roll revealed a ribbon of the spice, swathed in buttery brown sugar and laced with additional pecans. Gastronomic nirvana in every mouthful!

And nearly guilt-free, too. Cinnamon is recognized as high in antioxidants. It's purported to stimulate the brain, lower blood pressure, and offer many other health benefits. Add the nutritional power of nuts, and this pastry is practically health food. Zee-worthy, to be sure.
