And here are Eddie and I with our matching book promo t-shirts.




My heartfelt thanks to all my friends who have re-posted and shared my Facebook posts, helping to spread the word that the book is out.

The Great Pastry Hunt: Update

I spent the first half of September traveling, visiting friends and family 'back east.' Here's my favorite, from Servatti's French Bakery.

Cherry Cheese Crown



It's easy to see why these are named 'Crowns.' If you look closely toward the bottom of the pastry in the photograph, you can see a hint of the sweet dough cup that forms the base. From that, you can judge the size of the 'crown' part! But don't skip the pastry cup. With the first bite, I encounter a thick bed of cinnamonsugar, crumbly, spicy, and sweet. That's followed by a slightly tangy cheese layer that melts like silk on my tongue. The top of the pastry is kissed with a light glaze of frosting, in the center of which rest several succulent cherries. They reward me with a burst of sweet-tart juice that cleanses my palette and prepares me for another mouth-watering bite. Yum!
